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### **At-a-Glance Summary**

# Community Served



The St. Joseph Medical Center Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) identified Pierce County as the primary service area of the hospital. Pierce County has over 900,000 residents. The county is primarily comprised of non-Hispanic white residents, with the Hispanic population representing 11% of the population. The proportion of adults 55 years and higher continues to increase. 43.8% of Pierce County students were eligible for free or reduced-price lunch.

### Significant Community Health Needs Being Addressed


The significant community health needs the hospital is helping to address and that form the basis of this document were identified in the hospital's most recent Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). Needs being addressed by strategies and programs are:



- Access to Care (includes Maternal Child Health)
- Chronic Disease

- Behavioral Health
- Violence Prevention

### Strategies and Programs to Address Needs



**Access to Care:** Support programs that help those who are unhoused, uninsured, or under-insured obtain quality, affordable care. Increase community education and access to maternal child health programs.

**Behavioral Health:** Support programs that break down barriers to receiving quality mental health treatment, such as virtual behavioral health care. Expand outpatient behavioral health programs in Pierce County.



**Chronic Disease:** Support programs that prevent and manage chronic disease, with a focus on heart disease and diabetes. Work with faith communities to build health ministry teams within congregations.

**Violence Prevention:** Expand the VMFH Youth Violence Prevention Initiative in Pierce County. Support efforts to prevent human trafficking and sexual assault through community groups and hospital task forces.

# Anticipated Impact



**Access to Care:** VMFH intends to increase the number of community members enrolled in insurance, especially Medicaid. VMFH intends to increase the quality and capacity of medical respite care in Pierce County.

**Behavioral Health:** VMFH intends to increase capacity for both inpatient and outpatient behavioral health care. VMFH intends to build better linkages to receiving behavioral health care in the wider community.

**Chronic Disease:** VMFH intends to increase access to healthy food for vulnerable community members with chronic diseases. VMFH will expand health education programs in the community.

**Violence Prevention:** VMFH will expand capacity of community-based organizations that focus on youth violence and human trafficking.

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**Access to Care:** VMFH and St. Joseph Medical Center intend to work with Pierce County Project Access, Catholic Community Services, Tacoma Pierce County Health Department, and numerous other community organizations.

**Behavioral Health:** VMFH will work with Wellfound Behavioral Health Hospital, Concert Health, various behavioral health agencies and community partners to achieve our goals.

**Chronic Disease:** VMFH will collaborate with Emergency Food Network, Blue Zones Project, faith communities, and other community organizations.

**Violence Prevention:** VMFH will work with Tacoma Pierce County Health Department, Safe Streets, and numerous neighborhood groups to reduce youth violence. We will work with Rebuilding Hope and various community organizations to reduce human trafficking.

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### **Our Hospital and the Community Served**

### About Virginia Mason Franciscan Health and St. Joseph Medical Center

Virginia Mason Franciscan Health is a nonprofit health system with over 300 sites of care, 11 toptier hospitals, 18,000 team members, and over 5,600 physicians and advanced practice providers throughout the Puget Sound region.

St. Joseph Medical Center is a 374-bed hospital in Tacoma, WA. St. Joseph employs over 3,100 employees and, in Fiscal Year 2021, generated over 116,000 inpatient days and over 41,000 emergency room visits. Community benefit, the cost of charity care, uncompensated care, and community programs, totaled over \$69 million in 2022.

### **Our Mission**

St. Joseph Medical Center's dedication to assessing significant community health needs and helping to address them in conjunction with the community is in keeping with its mission. As CommonSpirit Health, we make the healing presence of God known in our world by improving the health of the people we serve, especially those who are vulnerable, while we advance social justice for all.

### Financial Assistance for Medically Necessary Care

St. Joseph Medical Center delivers compassionate, high quality, affordable health care and advocates for members of our community who might have difficulty accessing and paying for necessary medical care. In furtherance of this mission, the hospital provides financial assistance to eligible patients who do not have the capacity to pay for medically necessary health care services, and who otherwise may not be able to receive these services. 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### Description of the Community Served

St. Joseph Medical Center is located in Tacoma, WA. A summary description of the community is below. Additional details can be found in the CHNA report online.

The Community Health Needs Assessment St. Joseph Medical Center included information for all of Pierce County, WA. This community has 900,000 residents. Pierce County is mostly White, Hispanic and Black with an increasing number of adults age 55-74 years old. Pierce County has a lower proportion of residents who report they spoke English 'less than very well' compared to the state. The proportion who spoke English "less than very well' was highest among those who primarily spoke an Asian or Other Pacific Islander language.

43.8% of students in Pierce County are eligible for free or reduced-price lunch, which is slightly higher than the state average. The four-year average percentage of adults aged 25 years or older who earned at least a bachelor's degree was lower in Pierce County compared to the state average.

Life expectancy within Pierce County was significantly lower compared to the state. Within the County women tended to live significantly longer compared to men. Individuals identifying with more than one race had the longest life expectancy, while Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islanders had the shortest life expectancy.



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### **Community Assessment and Significant Needs**

The health issues that form the basis of the hospital's community health implementation strategy and programs were identified in the most recent CHNA report, which was adopted in May 2022. The CHNA contains several key elements, including:

- Description of the assessed community served by the hospital;
- Description of assessment processes and methods;
- Presentation of data, information and findings, including significant community health needs;

### Significant Needs the Hospital Does Not Intend to Address

St. Joseph Medical Center intends to address all priority health areas from the CHNA. Maternal Child Health will be addressed in both the access to care and chronic disease areas instead of as a standalone section.

St. Joseph Medical Center is dedicated to improving community health and delivering community benefit with the engagement of its management team, board, clinicians and staff, and in collaboration with community partners.

This implementation strategy was created with input from multiple VMFH leaders and staff. Some of the departments involved included Mission, Community Health, Community Relations, Administration, Care Management, and the Board of Directors.

Community input and contributions to this implementation strategy included discussions with external community groups, public health departments, community-based organizations, and other health systems.

The programs and initiatives described here were selected based on their alignment with identified community health priorities, resources available to address these challenges, and availability of partnerships to reach underserved populations.



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### Community Health Strategic Objectives

St. Joseph Medical Center believes that program activities to help address significant community health needs should reflect a strategic use of resources and engagement of participants both inside and outside of the health care delivery system.

CommonSpirit Health has established four core strategic objectives for community health improvement activities. These objectives help to ensure that our program activities overall address strategic aims while meeting locally-identified needs.



Create robust alignment with multiple departments and programmatic integration with relevant strategic initiatives to optimize system resources for advancing community health.



Scale initiatives that complement conventional care to be proactive and community-centered, and strengthen the connection between clinical care and social health.



Work with community members and agency partners to strengthen the capacity and resiliency of local ecosystems of health, public health, and social services.



Partner, invest in and catalyze the expansion of evidence-based programs and innovative solutions that improve community health and well-being.
