## Instructions for Pre Medication with Benadryl & Prednisone

**CT Scan** (Computed Tomography Scanning) uses a thin X-ray beam to produce images of the body that are thin slices. These slices provide high resolution images of both bone and soft tisses. Depending on the type of scan your physician has requested, you may be given a thin barium solution to drink and/or an injection of IV contrast or X-ray dye as part of your exam.

Patients with risk factors such as asthma or a previous allergic response to IV contrast are more likely to experience an allergic type reaction. Your physician has recommended that you take a combination of Prednisone and Benadryl® before your exam. This will reduce the chance of experiencing an allergic response.
